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Fround breaking for Greater Portmore Health Centre



The Greater Portmore Health Centre in St. Catherine is being upgraded to a Type 5 Comprehensive facility with state-of-the-art features to enhance healthcare delivery for residents.

Minister of Health and Wellness, Dr. the Hon. Christopher Tufton, on Wednesday December 11, 2024, signed the \$660 million contract and broke ground for the expansion works.

The project is part of a \$10 billion investment by the Government in the development of health infrastructure across the parish under the Health Systems Strengthening Programme (HSSP).

The programme is a collaborative effort supported by international partners, including the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) and the European Union (EU).

It will provide dedicated spaces for x-ray, oral rehydration, laboratory, isolation, asthma treatment, diabetic retinopathy, physiotherapy, among other specialty treatment areas.

It will also include an administrative department with office spaces, training areas, a conference room, staff lounge, nurses' station and lunchrooms.

The contract sum entails construction cost and equipment installation upon completion.

Other projects being undertaken in St.

Catherine under the HSSP include the redevelopment of the Spanish Town Hospital and upgrading of the St. Jago Park and Old Harbour Health Centres.

Advanced Technology Gives Big Boost to Jamaica's Breast Cancer Testing Capabilities

Jamaica has strengthened its diagnostic capacity with the recommissioning of a new immunohistochemistry (IHC) machine for advanced breast cancer testing on January 15, 2025. Available at the National Public Health Laboratory, the machine being commissioned, the 'Ventana', not only helps in confirming a cancer diagnosis but also supports prognosis and treatment by providing invaluable information about the origin and characteristics of the cancer, which is critical for personalising patient treatment plans.



The commissioning of the 'Ventana' is the result of a three-year project investment by Roche Caribbean valuing USD\$362,875.00. The figure represents the cost for installation, maintenance and contributions in test reagents, with additional resources provided by the Ministry of Health and Wellness.

Roche, a leader in biotechnology, offers differentiated medicines in cancer treatments, distinguishing itself in histological diagnosis of cancer and innovations in breast cancer treatment. Renewing its partnership with Jamaica, which dates back to 2015.

Noting the company's vested interests in improving cancer care, Alvaro Soto, General Manager of Roche for the Caribbean, Central America, and Venezuela highlighted its commitment to health innovations for early, comprehensive disease management.



Roche's partnership will allow for optimised breast cancer testing and diagnosis in Jamaica and improvement in the quality of tumor tissue samples collected.

Breast Cancer remains the leading cause of cancer-related death among Jamaican women. In 2022, an estimated 1,327 new cases of breast cancer were recorded in Jamaica, according to the Global Cancer Observatory, along with an estimated 684 breast cancer deaths. It is projected that 1 in 21 Jamaican women will be diagnosed with breast cancer.

Already in place are plans for training and education of staff in use of the IHC machine and preventive and corrective maintenance to ensure its optimal functioning. This forms part of the latest provisions embedded in the Ministry's new Medical Equipment Management Policy that addresses equipment maintenance issues affecting health service delivery.

14 Children Receives Heart Surgeries at BHC

Fourteen children battling congenital heart disease have been given a second chance at life, thanks to a remarkable medical mission led by Professor Jeffrey Jacobs, Professor of Surgery and Paediatrics in the **UF Health Congenital Heart** Centre and UF Health Shands Children's Hospital and former Cardiac Surgeon, of Johns Hopkins University. Prof Jacobs is also founder and chairman of the Cardiac Kids Foundation of Florida which led the team of over 50 volunteers. The surgeries were performed on January 17-21, 2025, at the Bustamante Hospital for Children.

This extraordinary mission was supported by the donation of critical medical equipment,



including Heater-Cooler machines, Heart-Lung machines, and Cell Saver machines. These contributions, alongside the team's expertise and hands-on training, have strengthened the hospital's capacity to continue delivering high-quality cardiac care to heart patients.

The success of this mission was made possible through the combined efforts of BHC, The Blood Bank, Cardiac Kids Foundation of Florida, and their supporting partners. Chain of Hope Jamaica played a vital role in coordinating the mission's activities, ensuring a seamless and impactful effort to save these young lives.

Professor Jacobs and his team's compassion and commitment have not only transformed the lives of 14 children and their families but have also left a lasting impact on the healthcare system through knowledge-sharing and resource enhancement. This initiative underscores the power of collaboration and the shared mission of mending little hearts and transforming lives.

Princess Margaret Hospital to Benefit from Major Investments

The Princess Margaret Hospital (PMH) in St. Thomas will benefit from a major investment in the upcoming financial year 2025-2026. Speaking at the hospital's 70th-anniversary Thanksgiving Church Service on Sunday, February 23, 2025 Mr. Wentworth Charles, Board Chairman-SERHA, detailed the planned upgrades for PMH. The initiative includes major projects such as the construction of a new morgue, an upgrade to dietary services, expansion of existing facilities, installation of a 150,000-gallon water tank and the upgrade of housing accommodations for nurses and senior medical residents.

The recent advancements in medical technology and infrastructure, such as state-of-the-art equipment, including a digital X-ray machine, have strengthened the hospital's ability to provide quality care. Continuous upgrades include a CT scan machine, enhanced ultrasound services, laboratory services, additional hospital beds, surgical equipment, and an upgraded electrical system. Additionally, improved roadways have significantly enhanced access to the hospital.

Mr. Charles informed that multiple investments have already been made in St Thomas' health infrastructure, in anticipation of its growth. He stated that "Millions of dollars have been spent on Arcadia, Port Morant and other health centres, giving support to the wider community so that the burden can be taken off Princess Margaret Hospital."

He lauded those who contributed to PMH's continued success; the visionary leadership of medical professionals including the doctors, nurses, midwives and support staff both past and present.

STUDY LEAVE

Excerpts from the Staff Order for Public Service

7.8.5 Part-time Study Courses

(i) Officers may be granted time-off by the appropriate authority to pursue courses of study at approved institutions, on a part-time basis, during established working hours.

(ii) The application for, and grant of such leave are subject to the conditions established from time to time by the Ministry with responsibility for the Public Service.

7.9 Half Pay Leave

(i) Permanent Secretaries and Heads of Departments may be granted half-pay leave to permanent employees on the ground of urgent private affairs, where the full-pay leave for which the employee is entitled has been exhausted.

(ii) In order to qualify, employees should have a minimum of six (6) years continuous service from the date of first permanent appointment.

(iii) Employees with less than six (6) years continuous service may be granted half-pay leave by the Permanent Secretary in the Ministry with responsibility for the Public Service.

(iv) The combined total of full pay leave and half-pay leave for permanent annually paid employees should not exceed the maximum amount of leave which may be accumulated by the employee.

(v) The amount of half-pay leave which may be granted to permanent weekly paid employees, together with any pay leave should not exceed ninety (90) days at any time.

(vi) Payment for half-day leave to any employee will only be made after the employee resume duties.
